

From Rev'd Derek McClean of Cliff Park Community Church

Presbyterians love the Psalms. They can't get enough of them. The Psalms provide the full range of emotions: life & love, hope & despair, pain & sorrow. Above all, they celebrate God and what He has done for us.



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

# Gorleston-on-Sea Heritage Group

Royal Visits to Gorleston: 1930 & Onwards by Chris Wright

In 1930, the **Prince of Wales** (who became King Edward 8th in 1936) visited Great Yarmouth to open the new £200,000 Haven Bridge on October 21st. He was greeted by huge crowds. As Master of the Merchant Navy, he visited the Fish Wharf where "fisher lassies mobbed the Prince". 8,000 men and 3,000 fisher girls were on the quay. Nearly two miles of drifters were moored, and a thousand horns were sounded as he toured the site. The Yarmouth Mercury reported that "he came in homely style. HRH did not wear a uniform but just a friendly suit of grey with a soft collar and bowler hat". The Prince had travelled to the town by train but left by "a little red aeroplane" from a field owned by Mr Stuart Cook, off Church Road in Gorleston (probably where the East Norfolk College is now located).

In 1931 on April 9th, the **Duke and Duchess of York** attended the National Union of Teachers Benevolent and Orphans Fund meeting at the Britannia Pier. They were greeted at Southtown station and received at the Town Hall. "Large crowds lined the main street from the Town Hall to the Britannia Pier and gave an enthusiastic welcome to the Duke and Duchess." The Duke congratulated them on their work and on raising nearly £52,000. He reflected "if there was anything finer than helping young people get a chance." They left by car for Beccles. (In 1936, the Duke became King George 6th.)

In 1931 on June 17th, **Prince George** (later King George) as the President of the Norfolk Agricultural Association, arrived by air at Gorleston and motored to the South Denes to visit their show. The Prince watched the procession of prize winners. The Prince was successful in winning a first prize in the shire horse section and prizes in the Red Poll section. Cheers were raised as his car travelled back to Gorleston for an easy take-off departure for Windsor.

On 23rd August 1940, **King George 6th** visited the area as part of a 150-mile tour of coastal defences. At Gorleston, he was met by a guard of honour of the Royal Norfolk Regiment, and he inspected a parade of officers and men from the minesweepers and WRNS. Despite the secrecy surrounding his visit crowds turned out to greet him. On leaving Gorleston, he travelled to Yarmouth and to Nova Scotia near Caister.

In 1954 on December 2nd, **The Duke of Edinburgh** arrived by train, to open the new Technical High School in Gorleston. A car took the Duke to the Town Hall where he met dignitaries and Gorleston Leading Fireman, Frederick William Sadd, who had received a George Medal for his rescue work in the 1953 Floods. The Duke re-joined his car to go on a brief tour of the

town which was thronged with crowds. Along Southtown Road, drifters in the harbour sounded their horns. In the Shrublands and Magdalen Estates school pupils lined the streets. The Duke's speech remarked how staff were the key, and that education was about preparing children for citizenship and jobs that make best use of their abilities. The new school was wonderful and a tribute to the town. If the bad weather continued, a course for frogmen could be added to the curriculum! After unveiling a plaque he toured the school. The Duke returned to the Town Hall for lunch and left to visit the British Sugar factory at Cantley.

On 18th November 1960, the **Duke** flew a helicopter of the Queen's Flight over the Technical High School en route to visit the Birds Eye factory where many Gorleston people worked. The pupils formed a message, "Welcome Again Prince Philip", on the playing field which the Duke acknowledged. A crowd had assembled on Darby's Hard to watch the Duke land.

On 30th May 1963, the **Duke of Edinburgh** returned to Gorleston piloting a helicopter of the Queen's Flight and landing at Cliff Park Secondary Modern School on a tour of ten Duke of Edinburgh Award centres. He witnessed displays of gymnastics, boxing, archery, judo, fencing, animal care and childcare. The East Anglian School gave first aid demonstrations. Pupils from other local schools attended alongside the St Andrews Youth Club, Gorleston Life Brigade, Boys Brigade and cadet forces. The Duke was pleased with the visit.

# **Emergency Services:** Fire & Rescue

#### All Welcome at Fire Station Open Day

Gorleston Fire Station is hosting an open day this summer and the crew invites local residents along to find out more about our role in your community.

Our on-call crew is ready to respond whatever the emergency, firefighters deal with a wide range of incidents including fires, flooding, water rescue, animal rescue and road traffic collisions.

We want to invite you to find out more about our staff, our work and the equipment we use.

Our FREE open day is being held on Saturday 17th August from 10am to 5pm.

Come and meet the crew, enjoy games for all ages and tuck into some food and drink.

Visitors will be able to look around a fire engine, see some demonstrations and have a look at our aerial ladder platform which is used to rescue people from height and tackle fires from above (incident permitting of course!).

You will be able to talk about any fire safety concerns you have in your home & community and find out more about our prevention work.

Other emergency services are hoping to be in attendance too so you can come along and meet them.

Gorleston crew works closely with other emergency services and other agencies as well as fire crews from across Norfolk and often over the border from Suffolk given our location.

The fire station is based in High Road. Everyone is welcome to attend the open day.

# **Parish Nursing**

Hello, my name is Ruth, and I am a Parish Nurse here in Gorleston.

I am a registered mental health nurse and worked locally in the NHS for 36 years before taking early retirement in November 2022.

I had felt for some time that God was calling me away from my role in the NHS but that He was asking me to use my skills, knowledge, and experience to support our church vision to reach out to our community. So, with the support of the leadership team and congregation at Cliff Park Community Church (CPCC), our Parish Nursing service started in April 2023.

So, what is Parish Nursing?

Helen Wordsworth, a Baptist minister and nurse, established Parish Nursing Ministries UK (PNMUK) in 2005.

Parish Nurses are registered nurses who work in communities alongside churches and Christian organisations to bring wholistic care to communities. They assess local health needs and work on health improvement through education, advice, advocacy, and referrals. They may lead health-focused groups, clarify medical information, and support individuals in health crises. They offer support to people of all ages, from all backgrounds, and of any faith or none.

Parish Nurses complement, but do not established replace, healthcare services. Each Parish Nursing service is shaped by the needs of the area and the calling of the nurse, and so my focus is on mental health and wellbeing. The impact of the pandemic on people's mental health is well recognised, however, there are many things that affect mental health; our personal history, family, relationships and how we see ourselves. Our social circumstances including our housing, employment, and education also play their part. While it's not possible to stop all mental ill-health from developing, many mental health problems can be prevented with early intervention and the right approach. Prevention can help all of us, whether we currently have good mental health or not.

I am available on a Tuesday and Thursday during school term time.

#### Coastwatch



National Coastwatch Institution formed in 1994, at a time when the Coast Guards were experiencing cutbacks and reorganising. Its foundation was prompted by an incident in Cornwall, when a fishing boat sank in view of a then unmanned Coast Guard lookout. The local population decided to man that look out as volunteers and the NCI was born, its mantra being, 'eyes along the coast.' The institution is a registered charity and each station is responsible for raising funds.

Gorleston station has been manned since 1995, it being number 24 of 60 NCI stations around the coast of UK. We keep a visual watch of our area of the beach and coastline and also monitor various VHF radio channels, including the distress channel. Our station is manned eight hours a day in the winter and 12 hours a day in the summer and is only closed on Christmas Day. We at Gorleston do this in various ways, such as carrying out bucket collections when we can and also giving talks to various clubs, which sometimes generate a donation. We are always open to discussions with various local companies who might consider sponsoring us.

National Coastwatch Institution celebrates its 30th year this year, marking the amazing achievement by taking a commemorative flag to each of its 60 Stations in turn during this summer. Currently it is due to arrive here at Gorleston, from the Felixstowe Coastwatch Station on the 10th August. On the 11th of August it departs Gorleston for Mundesley Station, before continuing northwards, visiting the remainder of the stations on the east coast.





# Ramblings of a Displaced Cockney

#### There is Another Way



Years ago, Jenny and I had a Ford Cortina estate. It was bright yellow and it was admittedly a "bargain" purchase. We bought it because we were about to move from Ilford in East London, up to Lancashire, as I had taken a job in Manchester. We thought that the estate would give us more flexibility in helping to get stuff up there, to cope with the early weeks before we could move into our house in Haslingden and

while everything else was in storage.

That car certainly had its moments. David, our first child was born in February and sometime after that, one Friday evening, we were driving down to see family in London when the lower pulley wheel on the belt assembly just sheared in a circle around the middle. Amazingly, the AA got us to a local garage who could replace it and they got us on our way! Strangely this same thing happened again that summer when my friend Neil and I were heading to the Isle of Skye for some climbing. Again, we were really lucky, as even though it was getting late at the start of a bank holiday weekend, a local garage got it welded. Fearing the worst, we opted to go back down to Lancashire and on to climb in North Wales.

It was later that year when the concept of the same fault recurring came back with a vengeance. One morning, on starting-up the engine, the petrol filter literally exploded, dumping the contents of the oil sump onto the road beneath. Wow, it must have been a faulty fuel filter!? I had never heard of that, but I just bought a new one anyway. Shortly afterwards, the same thing happened again! I contacted the local Ford dealer and told them what had happened, only to be told: "Sorry, but there's no such fault: it can't happen!". My response was simple: "I'll bring it round to your showroom, park it in the middle of your shiny sales floor and start it up, and we can see if there is no such fault!" Their panicked reply was "No, please don't do that: we'll ask Ford HQ about it!"

Sure enough, two days later I had a phone call from the Head of Engineering at Ford in Warley in Essex. His response was interesting: "Yes, I recall that we once had a case of this. It's a sticking ball bearing in the oil pressure relief valve, it needs replacing."

"But," I said, "that's inside the engine, isn't it? So, you need to take the engine out of the car to get at it don't you?"

"Yes," he agreed, "You have to take the engine out." Then he thought for a while and said: "There is another way!"

"What you could do instead, is to put a steel joist over the car and attach the engine by chains to the joist. Then instead of lifting out the engine, you leave it where it is and just lower the car!!"

I must admit that I was flabbergasted: "Basically" I said "That amounts to exactly the same thing as taking the engine out doesn't it!." He couldn't but agree!

When it came down to it, there was "another way": I scrapped the car and got a Fiesta!





#### **Pavilion Theatre**

It's wonderful to be back writing again for the Gorleston Community Magazine. Huge congratulations to the team for all of their hard work in relaunching this fantastic community resource and long

may it continue!

Writing this latest piece has given us time to reflect on everything that has happened since the last edition back in January - and what a whirlwind of a 6 months it has been!

We at the Gorleston Pavilion Trust officially took over the Pavilion Theatre building back in February and since then we've been hard at work launching some new initiatives and getting going with some fairly major refurbishment projects. These including:

- Opening our Box Office 7 days a week, from 10am-3pm
- Launching our new Community Hub 3 days a week, Tues-Thurs from 10am-3pm
- Refurbishing our stage and backstage areas and installing new sound equipment
- Refurbishing our studio, including a brand new floor
- Receiving planning consent for a new roof and baluster repairs

Back in January, the Mayor also unveiled a new blue plaque on the front of our building, marking our addition to the Great Yarmouth Local History & Archaeological Society historical walking trails. We also launched our new 'Buy-a-Brick' scheme as part of our latest '£50k Fundraiser' campaign, which will help us to fund vital repairs to our building. We also launched a brand new season of 'Summer Showtime', our popular variety show which runs weekly from May to October, and a new season of 'Summer Sundays at the Bandstand' - a weekly all-day festival now with double the amount of live music. Planning for our 2024 pantomime 'Cinderella' is also well underway and our Pavilion Players will also be presenting 'The Producers' in the autumn, our first in-house musical.







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# Gorleston Then & Now

Above is a very early photograph of St. Mary Magdalene Church in Gorleston. The foundation stone was laid on 4th July 1957 and the project cost £18,000. It was consecrated on 6th November 1958. It must be unfinished in this photograph above, as work is in progress and the entrance is still fenced off. However, the first church building on the Magdalen Estate was dedicated on 17th April 1951. This building was described as a 'Prefabricated Ministry of Works 24 foot span building, with brick ends and a panelled ceiling'\*. This is the building still in use today as the Church Hall adjoining the church. The vicarage, located on Nuffield Crescent, behind the church, was dedicated on 7th November 1965. As seen in the current day photo below, housing development has continued since the church was built, trees have established and cars have increased.

\*This was a Government Department formed in 1940 to deal with building projects, approx. 7.3 metres

#### **New Facility Up & Running**

On July 24th, James Paget opened it's new, purpose-built facility, the 'Community Diagnostic Centre.' It offers to patients access to new MRI and CT scanning equipment, as well as X-ray and Ultrasound imaging, the first of three new buildings at each of Norfolk & Waveney's three hospitals.

Constructed following £85.9 million capital investment from the Department of Health and Social care, the Centre will be used to improve access to to diagnosis & monitoring of a wide range of conditions, including cancer, heart disease, stroke, respiratory diseases, trauma, musculoskeletal diseases and neurology.

It is situated on the main hospital adjacent site, the Louise to Hamilton Centre, with appointments available from Sunday to Friday, 8a.m. to 8p.m. For



x-rays and 8:30a.m. to 8:30p.m. for all other treatments, with a focus on outpatient and GP referrals, while the hospital's existing imaging department focusing on emergency and inpatients.

#### Race for Life



One of the Paget's Cancer Specialist Nurses, Tracey Noakes, took part in the Race for Life in Nottingham, alongside her son Sam, raising the most money out of anyone at the event. Tracey looks after patients with upper gastrointestinal cancer, and has undergone surgery & radiotherapy for breast cancer she was diagnosed with a few months ago. She took part in the event, determined to do something to help others.

Ahead of the fundraiser, she said, 'My mum and my brother both died very prematurely from cancer and every year I have taken part in a Race for Life in memory of them. I never thought I would one day end up doing it for myself too, and so this year's Race for Life is even closer to home for me and I am determined to give it my all.'

And she did, completing the 10 kilometre (6.2 mile) course

in just one hour and 17 minutes, and raising £3,400 for Cancer Research UK.

Tracey said, 'My son Sam suggested we do a Race for Life together and on Sunday 23 June we ran the 10K along the Victoria Embankment in Nottingham. It was a beautiful setting, although exceptionally warm. I completed the run in 1h 17m and, even though it was more about finishing the run rather than the finishing time, I was happy with that given what I have just been through.

'But the best thing about the whole day was that, out of all those people there in Nottingham, Sam and I raised the most money – an astonishing £3,400. We were called up to the stage and presented with a certificate and medal - it was pretty humbling and we were so proud.

'The kindness and generosity of family, friends, colleagues and supporters has been overwhelming and Sam and I thank you all so much.'






